OREGON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE FACTS

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IN OREGON

- Between 1997 and 2003, 123 homicides occurred among Oregonians age 12 and older, due to intimate partner violence.¹
- Between 1997 and 2003, 46% of female homicide victims and 4% of male homicide victims were killed by intimate partners.²
- A 2001-2002 survey conducted in Oregon showed that one in ten women experienced intimate partner violence in the five years preceding the survey-more than 85,000 women.³
- In Oregon, 2,735 adult survivors of domestic violence and/or sexual assault were sheltered in emergency shelters, motels and safe homes in 2007. Of those 2,735, 48% had children with them.⁴
- There were 14,739 requests for shelter by adult victims of domestic violence in Oregon that could

- The Oregon Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence is a feminist organization made up of programs across the state that serve victims and survivors of domestic and sexual violence.
- Their mission is to raise awareness about violence against women and children and to work towards non-violence through advocacy, public policy, resource development, and social change.

SEXUAL ASSAULT IN OREGON

- One out of every six adult women in Oregon has been the victim of forcible rape at some point in her lifetime. This amounts to about 230,000 adult women total.⁷
- 7% of Oregon's 8th grade females and 10% of 11th grade females have been physically forced to have sex.⁸
- The lifetime prevalence of rape among adult women in Oregon was somewhat higher than the estimate for the nation as a whole in 2003.⁹

CHALLENGES

- The estimated costs of intimate partner violence in Oregon, a state currently facing serious economic problems due to high unemployment rates and slow economic growth, exceed \$50 million each year.¹⁰
- Domestic Violence service providers in the large, rural counties in the eastern half of the state of Oregon face many challenges common to rural areas, especially underreporting.¹¹
